

Q2. How far do sources C and D differ in their opinion of protesters?

8 Marks

Level 1

One statement taking details from source(s) without comparison. Makes unsupported inferences.

1-2

e.g. Morrison was pulled off the stage because he was a CO.

Level 2

One developed statement supported by sources **and/or own knowledge** to make a supported inference about how the sources differ or are similar.

4-5

e.g. Morrison explains that his anti-war message received angry heckling and ultimately he was dragged off the podium, this was because the public during WWI was very hostile against Cos...

Two or more developed statements supported by sources **and own knowledge** to make supported inferences about how the sources differ or are similar.

6

e.g. By contrast, Source D which was written by a poll tax demonstrator in prison, states that both inmates as well as the police seemed to support him indirectly with positive comments.

Level 3

Developed explanation and makes a judgement about how far they are similar or different which is supported by the sources **and knowledge**:

7-8

e.g. poll tax was widely disliked... so the fact that inmates and prison wardens were sympathetic towards Ramsell helps to explain...

Q4 Using sources F, G, H, I and J how far do you agree with the following statement “protest is a successful way of getting what you want”?

12 Marks

Level 3

Developed explanation and makes a **reasoned judgement** (examines both sides of the argument) on the question using the sources and own knowledge to support the answer.

11-12

e.g. All three protests changed law and law enforcement in their own ways. For example, the poll tax protests showed that widespread civil disobedience generated from local communities at grassroots level, could significantly change the attitude of the government quickly and, in effect, push a Premier out of office. By contrast, COs had to endure...
